Implementing Urban Reforms in India DFID Workshop on 12 and 13 October 2006

Background note prepared by Feedback Ventures

Introduction

According to the Census 2001, India's urban population was 27.8 percent of the total population—an increase from 25.7 percent as per census 1991. The percentage decadal growth of population in rural and urban areas during the decade is 17.9 and 31.2 percent respectively. The rate of growth of urban population is increasing but the rate of growth of urban poor is increasing at a faster rate and it is expected that India will soon have the world's largest population of urban poor.

Although urban centres present real opportunities for poor people, as economic growth, driven by urban development has the potential to increase their incomes, they also create and feed the conditions within which poverty spreads. The growth of population in urban areas is partly fuelled by movements of poor people from rural to urban areas, so that the spatial location of poor people has simply shifted. If urban governance systems do not have the skills, resources and the incentives to manage growth effectively, taking into account the needs and interests of all residents, poor people may not have the means to participate in the distribution of the benefits that urban development has to offer.

There is evidence that Indian cities have not been able to manage growth effectively. The presence of slums is evidence of the failure of governments to effectively manage the urban growth process. Slums reflect inequalities between income groups, with visible dimensions of poverty, overcrowding, poor environmental health and inadequate shelter, often in close proximity to wealth. Lack of capacity to plan for and manage municipal services like water supply, sanitation and solid waste disposal is evident in the new health threats emerging in urban areas. The incidence of malaria, dengue, and other vector borne diseases is increasing in urban areas, even in non-endemic states.

The challenge to strengthen urban governance systems to improve urban planning and management, to protect the urban environment, and to provide affordable basic services to all urban inhabitants, is at the centre of the process of urban reform.

To address the challenges of urban governance, the 74th Amendment was enacted thirteen years ago. While most state governments have also made the necessary amendments to their state acts, implementation has varied. Devolution of powers to the urban local bodies has varied with imbalances in the transfer of funds, functions and functionaries – in reality, elected municipal councilors have little power, no funds and are unaware of their roles and responsibilities.

Good urban governance: the key challenge

Strengthening municipal governance to tackle the challenges of improving service delivery in cities and towns, particularly for the poor, is the most fundamental challenge in implementing urban reforms. Improving governance structures and systems in urban local bodies essentially involves strengthening



institutional and organizational capacity, accountability and responsiveness. This broadly covers the following areas:

- Capacity building of city managers.
- Ensuring planned development.
- Improving the ability to raise capital and revenues.
- Creation of new infrastructure and improved municipal service delivery.
- Making governments more responsive and accountable to citizens and other stakeholders.
- Ensuring sustainable development that can tackle the looming environment challenges and benefit
 all.

Capacity building of city managers and clear accountability mechanisms at city level

There are multiple agencies for service delivery at city level – with each agency having its independent reporting structure, a structure that is not conducive to joint planning and implementation. The result of this functioning is dysfunction at local level arising out of this lack of clarity of roles and responsibilities. The scenario is further complicated with private service providers entering the scene especially in the field of power and telecommunications.

The key to resolution lies in better coordination across agencies, capacity building of functionaries and institutions and perhaps a change in mindset that looks at municipal agencies as 'business entities'. The first step towards better institutions and people lies in creating the necessary enabling environment through clarity in roles and responsibilities and separation of roles that will result in transparency and accountability.

Capacity building needs to move beyond city managers and include functionaries at all levels starting with the elected representatives. Institutions too need to be strengthened to enable them to be responsive to the changing development needs through simplification of processes and greater autonomy at local level.

Ensuring Planned Development

In the current urban scenario, planning has not been able to keep pace with the rising population. Migration and the floating population fuel the economic growth of cities, but also places greater pressure on already overburdened municipal infrastructure. Given the time lag between planning and its implementation, most interventions become outdated or designs unrealistic, especially in the face of rising population pressures.

This imbalance between planned development and service delivery is more glaring in the context of areas within municipal limits and those that are being managed by private developers—a phenomena that is on the rise. Slums and planned development are closely interlinked and there is need to explore affordable housing options for the urban poor. Planned urban development and implementation of sanctioned plans is an area that requires enforcement — given that it is highly susceptible to political interference and vested interests. Enforcement can become a reality only if there is greater public participation and awareness in municipal affairs—this therefore is another challenge.



Improving the ability to raise capital and revenue

Municipal financing needs to improve in terms of availability and management. Opportunities for local revenue generation are largely limited to property taxes that are not collected as per demand leading to a high dependence on grants and loans. Raising finances for capital expansion through structured borrowings from central, state governments or the capital market at large or through bonds are models that are being tried with varied degrees of success.

Exploring opportunities to meet the running costs of municipal services through increased coverage, reduction in collection costs and identifying new revenue sources are important. But, problems persist with rising establishment costs and little or no correlation between the cost of service provision and the determination of the user charge. There are few independent revenue sources at local level and the financial situation is critical in the light of legislation that is eroding the revenue base at city level. All this means that municipal councils have low credit ratings and find it difficult to explore alternate means of borrowings. Financial reforms that will lead to an improvement in the overall fiscal position are critical.

Creation of new infrastructure and improved municipal service delivery

Cities are restrained in their ability to fund new infrastructure and very often, new infrastructure is not the panacea for all problems. Unfortunately, the common belief in infrastructure planning is that "one size fits all" and plans are not flexible to respond to changing needs. Most often than not, beneficiaries have little or no say in the choice of infrastructure and therefore feel no sense of responsibility for their sustainability. Infrastructure also comes with the added burden of O&M—an area that is often ignored in the planning stage.

Given the limited ability of governments to meet all infrastructure needs, it is critical to explore alternate means through Public Private Partnerships and service delivery through outsourcing. There are many successful examples across the country and government encourages such interventions. PPP and outsourcing are here to stay and will be more economic in the long run but, local government must have the capacity to oversee these means of service delivery.

Making governments more accountable to citizens and other stakeholders

Current municipal governance offers limited opportunity for citizens to participate in decision-making and service delivery. By default, municipal councilors are the only route of 'voice' in most cases – there are however brilliant examples of structured citizens' participation in parts of the country. Getting municipalities and citizens to work together requires to be tackled in stages and creating the right environment at the institution level is the first step. Municipalities and citizens have to learn to work together and this requires substantial capacity building at both ends.

Sustainable development and managing the environment

Inequities in service delivery and access to infrastructure pose environmental challenges that are assuming critical proportions. Air and water quality in cities has been deteriorating over time. Most urban water supply systems suffer from poor management, incur heavy physical and financial losses, and are unable to supply the citizens with uninterrupted water supply. It is therefore uncertain if the drinking water



supplied to the citizens is safe. Sanitation systems are, similarly, poorly managed and unable to dispose of human waste safely. Solid waste management is becoming more critical every day. The lack of capacity to deliver on these fronts lead to health costs that are visited primarily on the poor.

City planning and management needs to set standards for sustainable development, and evolve clear strategies to reach these standards. Investment in sustainable building technologies, policies for promotion of such technologies, improved transport planning and management can lead to improvement in air quality. Better management practices, with emphasis on service standards and accountability are required to improve water and sanitation systems.

Finally, cities need to address vulnerability, particularly with regard to access to the built environment. City planning should be inclusive, enabling the elderly, the differently abled, and those with temporary disabilities, access to public infrastructure.

Recent initiatives: JNNURM

Recognizing the vital role of cities and towns in the country's socio-economic transformation and change, their contribution to the gross domestic product, their growing involvement in the global market against the backdrop of urban services being severely stressed, the Government of India, launched the Jawaharlal Nehru National Urban Renewal Mission (JNNURM) in 2005-06. The programmeme assumes that for cities to work, it is essential to create incentives and support for urban reforms at the state and city level, develop appropriate enabling frameworks, enhance the creditworthiness of municipal governments, and integrate service delivery for the urban poor with the overall city level service delivery system. It is also designed to facilitate private sector participation in service delivery and management and in implementing the reform agenda, provides for participation of business, industry, civic groups and communities in local decision-making. The programmeme comprises two Sub-Missions, viz., Sub-Mission for Urban Infrastructure and Governance, and Sub-Mission for Basic Services to the Urban Poor.

JNNURM visualizes a City Development Plan both as a perspective and a vision for the future development of a city. Accordingly, it should present the current stage of development of the city, set out the directions of change, identify thrust areas, suggest alternative strategies and interventions for bringing about the change, provide a framework and vision within which projects need to be identified and implemented, and establish a logical and consistent framework for evaluation of investment decisions. Further, it should provide a basis for cities to undertake urban sector reforms at state and city levels that help direct investment into city-based infrastructure.

The opportunities that are available through this programmeme are immense. Linking reforms with infrastructure funding and making local governments responsible for implementation are important first steps towards improved and financially sustainable cities.



Annexure

Urban Reform Projects supported by DFID- India

The Department for International Development (DFID) is the UK government department responsible for the UK's contribution towards global efforts to eliminate poverty. We operate mostly in partnership with Government of India (GoI) and with other developmental agencies. Along with national initiatives, four focus states of DFID-India are: Andhra Pradesh, West Bengal, Madhya Pradesh, and Orissa. DFID-India's Country Assistance Plan (CAP) for 2004-2008 identifies strategies to support the GoI in achieving the Tenth Plan and internationally agreed Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) by 2015.

DFID has a long history of Urban Development initiatives in India. Currently, in three of the focus states, (Andhra Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, and West Bengal), DFID has been working in partnership with the State Governments to support reforms in the urban sector. This support aims at strengthening municipal governance to function more efficiently and to provide better services to the urban poor. The programmes in Andhra Pradesh and West Bengal are mature programmes that have been under implementation for some time and are showing real improvements in the delivery of urban services. The design process for the urban reform programme for the state of Madhya Pradesh has recently been completed and approval to move to implementation has just been received.

1) Urban Reform in Andhra Pradesh

APUSP: Andhra Pradesh Urban Services for the Poor

APUSP is a partnership project between the Government of Andhra Pradesh and DFID, aimed at achieving sustained reduction in the vulnerability and poverty of the urban poor in Andhra Pradesh. The seven year project was launched in 1999, and involved a total financial commitment of £ 94.4 million grant funds. The project has since been extended by another two years, and will end in March 2008.

It initially covered 32 class 1 towns in Andhra Pradesh (population exceeding 100,000) but, after the mid-term review, project coverage was extended to 42 towns. The APUSP project comprises the following linked and complementary components:

i) C1- Reforms leading to improved municipal governance

This focuses on municipal reforms, with the aim of improving the performance of municipalities and contributing to the development of pro-poor policy for urban local bodies. This is being achieved through initiatives that strengthen municipal finance, municipal accounting, planning, operation and maintenance practices, and train staff in identified areas.

ii) C2- Environmental Services for the poor

This component aims at improvement of environmental infrastructure for sustainable provision of urban basic services to the poor. In physical terms, this translates into improvements in water supply, sanitation, solid waste management, drainage, roads, footpaths and street lighting, mainly in slum areas. Off-site infrastructure is also provided to link existing infrastructure to poor settlements where necessary.



iii) C3- Civil Society Strengthening

This component will strengthen civil society and will to build their capacity to voice the needs of the urban poor and advocate for an improved range and quality of service delivery at the local level.

Achievements of the programme

- CMAPP (Comprehensive Municipal Action Plan for Poverty Reduction) evolved and implemented in all municipalities. This tool is being used for infrastructure planning and interventions in poor settlements
- 2) Municipal Reforms- Efficiencies in procurement procedures, Accounting reforms in line with JNNURM requirements, Property tax assessment and collection, New tax net, complaint management systems in place in all target municipalities.
- 3) Major effort on creation of all women self help groups, federating them, and linking them to banks. Upadhi programme on wage employment in collaboration with Dr. Reddy Foundation
- 4) Municipalities' own resources increased by 300 percent.
- 5) Major initiatives on energy saving and on water and sanitation reform.
- 6) Third party quality assurance for all municipal works mandated by Government.

2) Urban Reform in West Bengal

Urban Services for the Poor

- This programme was started in 2003, with a financial commitment of up to £ 102 million over 7 years
- It is a partnership with the Government of West Bengal, to improve urban governance, access to services for the urban poor, economic development and livelihoods.
- 3) It covers all the municipalities in Kolkata Metropolitan Area except Kolkata Municipal Corporation
- 4) Recently, it has been agreed to extend the following specific components of the programme to all the other (85) municipalities in West Bengal
 - (a) Preparation of development plans
 - (b) Roll out of accounting reforms
 - (c) Preparation of citizens' charters

Achievements so far

- 1) Quick slum survey based broadly on CMAPP principles completed in all slums in KMA area
- Development planning in progress in all 40 ULBs
- Accounting Reforms- Double entry accrual based accounting systems being rolled out in all 40 ULBs
- 4) OD reforms being supported in the Municipal Administration Department, and the ULBs
- 5) Slum infrastructure work in progress and 3rd Party Quality Assurance procedures introduced
- All slum infrastructure being executed through community contracting- through the all women Community Development Societies established under SJSRY.



KEIP: Kolkata Environmental Improvement Project

- DFID is working with ADB on its Kolkata Environmental Improvement Programme to support sustained improvement in the environmental health and quality of life for the communities of Kolkata.
- 2) DFID support is in the form of a grant of up to £28.3 million over 6 years.
- While the ADB loan is for infrastructure uogradation / creation, the DFID component supports the capacity building of Kolkata Municipal Corporation

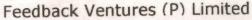
Achievements so far

We at Feedback Ventures are managing this workshop on behalf of DFID-India. The agenda for this workshop is attached for your reference.

DFID India has put together this workshop to facilitate sharing of experiences among a range of partners working in urban India. This is being done with the support of the Ministry of Urban Development and the Ministry of Housing and Urban Poverty Alleviation. This workshop will bring learning and experiences from the DFID focus states of Andhra Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, and West Bengal, together with recognized best practices from practitioners and government in other states.

The workshop will document some initiatives in urban reform, and stimulate discussion on the sustainability of the reform process, as well as the way forward.

Signed intent with IBM Canada Ltd. and Saskatchewan Telecommunications International, Inc., in conjunction with Bharat Sanchar Nigam Limited (BSNL), and is being funded by the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA). A pilot project will be carried out in some 30 villages {one kiosk each per village} of Hoshangabad and Harda District, both in Madhya Pradesh. Here, we are assigned to provide eHealth-Care Software at each kiosk.

Proposed Activities:

Health Cards will be issued to all the villagers on a fee who visit health centres for treatment (it holds details like, Registration Number, Password, individuals name, age, address & photograph) and details like (weight, blood group, allergies, diagnosis, treatment & medicine prescribed) is



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being uploaded and updated online which can be accessed from any where in the world. Online Medical advice will be arranged to the villager so that they need not to travel far off places.

The logic behind the concept and this technology is to benefit the population at large. It has been experienced that whenever a disease is cured we generally misplace our prescription. And especially in rural area people tend to forget what all diseases they have gone through and generally not able to narrate to the doctor when required.

For instance if doctor has to prescribe an 'antibiotic' to the patient, he has to have thorough knowledge of his past medical history. Which most of them do not have or not able to narrate as they are mostly illiterate.

The system will save doctors times because at one glance he can see the patient's past medical history and current medical reports after feeding User Id and password of the patient.

The government can have exact report on: How many patients are being examined in a remote health centre? Can track down doctor's presence? What all diseases prevalent in the area? Any spread of new disease can be known in minutes?

Generally it happens that medicines which does not have any relevance for a particular area is being supplied without giving proper result. E:g, Typhoid medicines are made available along with Jaundice in area where people suffering from Jaundice.

eHealth Care project to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of India's antiquated healthcare by use of information technology systems. eHealth-Care can achieve large cost savings and improve patient care by bringing the rural India health care systems into the information age.

PUD: Minutes of the meeting of the 8th Apex Advisory Committee of Urban Health Improvement Programmes held on 06.07.2005.

In the 8th meeting of the Apex Advisory Committee on Urban Health Improvement Programme held on 06.07.2005 while reviewing the status of Health Component under KUSP, the Committee requested the Project Director, CMU, KUSP to approach DFID for funding the expenditure towards the recent grant of Rs.250/- in addition to existing honorarium to each health worker or health staff under all Urban Health Improvement Programme.

In this connection it is to be mentioned that this enhancement of Rs.250/- in flat rate had been sanctioned by the Competent Authority to all grass root level health and staff with effect from October 2004in respect of all the community based health programmes i.e. CUDP-III, IPP-VIII in KMA, IPP -VIII(Extn) and RCH Sub Project Asansol in non-KMA. GO in this regard have already been issued by the Dept. vide order no. 1093/MA/N/C-10/1G-7/2002 dt 18th October, 2004. **

The programme- wise annual requirement of fund for enhanced amount of Rs.250/-per worker & staff is given below:

CUDP-III - Rs. 69.84 Lac
IPP-VIII - Rs. 181.80 Lac
IPP-VIII(Extn) - Rs. 52.17 Lac
RCH Sub Project - Rs. 18.15 Lac
Total - Rs. 321.96 Lac

DFID has granted a total amount of Rs. 2,900 Lac for Health component of KUSP for 8 years for strengthening of the existing services of HHW based health programmes. So the average estimated allotment per year works out to be Rs. 362 Lac (approx).

Thus it will be seen that if an amount of Rs. 321.96 Lac (Say.. Rs. 322 Lac) is utilised towards payment of honorarium of the workers and staff, an amount of Rs. 40 Lac only will be left to meet the expenditure for re-training / capacity building of the health functionaries, IEC activities, HMIS, refurbishment of Sub-Centres, and other activities towards strengthening of existing services of HHW scheme as envisaged in health component of KUSP.

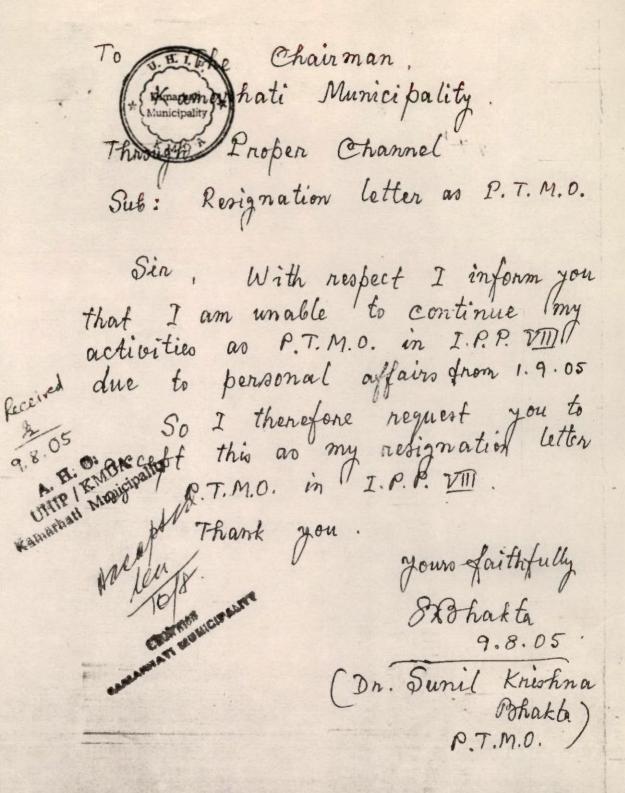

On 12th May, a detailed discussion was held regarding monitoring & supervision of the different health activities as planed during FY 2005 – 06. The meeting was participated by DFID Mission, Secretary, MA Dept., PD, CMU and other Officials concerned.

In addition to existing health services monitored & supervised by KMDA, a no. of new activities have been taken up by CMU for strengthening existing HHW scheme. The new activities are:

- Growth Recording, Monitoring of Under-Five children with corrective measures.
- Holding of adolescent care clinic, counselling, anaemia detection, treatment.
- Counselling on STD / HIV / AIDS with referral linkages.
- Community Need Assessment, Community mobilization, involvement & empowerment towards better utilisation and acceptance of health services.
- Implementation of National Health Programmes.
- Geographical re-allocation of blocks covering all the population e.g. APL, BPL & marginalised.
- Maintaining health data in regard to all the population of the ULB.
- Development & streamlining of Family Schedule, HMIS format.

The horizon of the above health services have been extended not only to 40 KMA ULBs but also to 22 Non-KMA ULBs where HHW scheme are already in existence.

The new components of health care services will require extensive training at all levels of health manpower i.e. HHW, FTS, STS, PTMO, Sanitary Inspector, Health Officer & Asstt. Health Officer.

The training for each of the components will cover each of 153 HAUs of KMA ULBs and 59 HAUs of Non-KMA covering approximately 5500 HHWs, 1050 FTSs, 200 STSs / ANM, 400 PTMOs and about 100 HO & AHOs. The training is to be conducted locally at HAU level of the ULBs which are widely spreaded and to be completed within 2 to 3 months for each of the training components which are of 2 to 4 days duration.

The responsibility of monitoring & supervision of implementation of training components as well as new health service activities at each Sub-Centre / HAU level of ULBs vests with CMU to ensure effective and meaningful output.

In view of all above, support of technical professionals as mentioned below are required.

This is to mention that if 6 Medical Officers and 6 Nutritionists are in position each of them may be entrusted with the responsibility for 10 ULBs. Thus, One Professional will be able to visit a ULB twice in a month which is bear minimum.

This matter had been discussed with DFID in length on 12.05.2005. DFID has agreed to the proposal.

Sub: Preparation of Draft Development Plan (DDP)

Sir/Madam,

As you might be aware the West Bengal Municipal Act 1993 requires Urban Local Bodies to prepare Draft Development Plan for a period of five years. Kolkata Urban Services for the Poor (KUSP) programme seeks to support preparation of Draft Development Plan by the Urban Local Bodies. According to Section 3.3.8 of the Project Memorandum for KUSP jointly signed by Govt. of India, Govt. of West Bengal and DFID India:

"KUSP envisages the DDP as a comprehensive business plan of the ULBs that sets out a broad vision and strategy, while also providing the framework for allocating project funds and government support. DDPs will address: economic development, land-use planning and control, infrastructure development, ULB revenue and expenditure, operation and maintenance of services, organization development and management issues. The DDP will provide a mechanism for bringing about convergence of different state and GoI programmes. Developing a robust process for the preparation of DDPs that reflects a consensus of all stakeholders and the preparation of DDPs themselves lies at the heart of this project. The DDP process would also include in its scope, the informal settlements within a municipality and would consider the rehabilitation and service needs of people living in such settlements".

Clause 3.3.9 of the Project Memorandum specifies the approval of DDPs by KMPC and availability of funds from KUSP programme after approval of DDPs. This section is reproduced below:

"The CMU will support the municipalities in preparing five-year horizon Draft Development Plans and put up their recommendations, including proposals for funding, to the KMPC. The KMPC will approve the DDPs. Funds for intra-municipal and trans-municipal infrastructure, representing about 31% of the total project budget, would become available to ULBs only after their respective DDPs are approved by the KMPC".

In view of the above it is proposed that Urban Local Bodies may take up preparation of DDPs from the month of July 2005 and submit the DDP within September 2006 at the latest to KMPC.

We envisage the stages for preparation and approval of DDP to be as follows:

Stage-1: Introduction of DDP in the ULB, constituting DDP Policy Group & DDP

Technical Groups and conducting Planning Workshops. Time: One month.

Stage-2: Formulation of Municipal Vision, finalisation of Development Objectives and

preparation of Plans for 3 components of DDP. Time: 9 Months.

Stage-3: Integration of 3 components into the DDP, Quality Review and adoption by

BOC. Time: 6 Months.

Stage-4: Submission to DPC, Submission to and approval by KMPC and final adoption

by BOC. Time: 6 Months.

The guidelines for preparation of Draft Development Plans have been framed. We shall be issuing the guidelines one after the other. In a few days we shall be sending Book 1: Launching the DDP. These guidelines will contain the initial actions (Stage-1) to be undertaken by Urban Local Bodies for formation of different groups to prepare the DDPs, actions for launching DDP and sensitization of stakeholders for the DDP preparation and overview of the entire DDP process and contents. The rest of the guideline will follow after this. We plan to issue the following other guidelines:

Book 3: Guidelines for preparation of Slum Infrastructure Plan

Book 4: Guideline for preparation of Intra Municipal Infrastructure Plan

It has been decided that one Urban Planner will be provided for two years to the Urban Local Bodies for coordinating the preparation of Draft Development Plan. The process of recruitment will be two-fold like the process followed in case of recruitment of Accounts and Finance Coordinator. A short list has been made available to ULBs for engaging of Urban Planners. However, the initial actions should be undertaken without waiting for engagement of Urban Planner.

Planners from KMDA or retired planner will also be involved in assisting the ULBs to prepare the Plan.

Training and orientation of various personnel engaged in DDP preparation will be arranged in due course.

Allotment for the initiation of DDP will be made shortly.

Some other inputs will also be provided like State of the Environment Report for KMA Area, Economic Trends in KMA Areas and draft Master Plans prepared by KMPC.

As a first step, the DDP exercise needs to be launched in the ULBs. I would request that the launching exercise be carried out by the ULBs before 31st July'05. The launching date may be informed to CMU at least 10 days beforehand so that the resource persons for the launching are organized from the end of CMU.

I request you to take up the matter with due seriousness and urgency so that the targeted dates for preparation of DDP is maintained.

I am sure that with your leadership, your ULB will be able to formulate a good quality DDP.

Target – Urban poor of a municipality or part of it (as applicable)

Objective -

- Documentation of the health status and the available health delivery systems
- Early detection & prompt intervention in case of both communicable and non communicable diseases (including life style related diseases)through free reporting/ councelling system and subsidized local health facility (involving local doctors)
- · Creating health awareness with special emphasis on personal hygiene
- Providing antenatal care & facilitating institutional confinement
- Child immunization
- Early detection & prompt treatment of child respiratory diseases
- Primary intervention of AIDS through awareness/ councelling drives
- Screening for cervical & breast cancer in women and oral cancer in all tobacco users
- Notification of disease

Activities -

The broad activities of the proposed project include:

- Undertaking field survey to generate primary data about the prevalent health delivery system and status of stakeholder urban poor in context to those.
- Select field workers in consultation with the municipality.
- Interact with all stakeholders including people's representatives to impress about the model and involve them in the whole process.
- Prepare/ strengthen physical and social infrastructure required for the project, in consultation with the municipality.
- Fine tune the model with inputs from local stakeholders and implement them.

Model -

- Ward level field unit
- A CHDP central unit either for a municipality or 2 municipalities as applicable (in active collaboration with local Municipalities as well as health structure available) will be prepared broadly having the following functions.
 - o Registration, collection & maintenance of records
 - o Disease specific periodic report generation & planning of intervention
 - o IEC campaign; execution & monitoring

- o Networking with the stake holders
- o Co-ordination between the Field Units & Overall monitoring
- o Basic investigation facilities

Uniqueness - The innovativeness/uniqueness of the project lies in its basic structure. It is believed that much of the mortality and morbidity problems could have been avoided if proper reporting mechanisms remain in place.

The project proposes to build up a system of reporting/counselling/awareness generation for the target urban poor population which will then be integrated with the general (mainly local doctors) and specialized health delivery mechanisms.

Sustainability of the project is ensured through local people/ ULB participation both in running the project as well as contributing to its cost (though subsidized low cost programme) giving them a sense of ownership to the project.

Sustainability – Since sustainability is an inbuilt component of the project with provision of participation of stakeholder community in running the project, the project will definitely have a local ownership and not follow the fate of many other health intervention projects taken from time to time, which get terminated once the project funds are withdrawn.

Roadmap - A pilot study is required to get a clearer picture about the target population and area, to facilitate proper build up of the project proposal.

The organisation has been collaborated / supported by several state and international agencies including Govt. of West Bengal, Kolkata Municipal Corporation, Kolkata Metropolitan Development Authority, Chittaranjan National Cancer Institute (CNCI), UNICEF, West Bengal Pollution Control Board among others from time to time in context to various projects. 1. Background

- 1.1. Govt. of West Bengal (GoWB) and DFID in 1999, agreed to collaborate on the development of the "Kolkata Urban Services for the Poor" (KUSP) programme aimed at: improving urban planning and governance; access to basic services for the poor and promoting economic growth in the KMA. The project will support improvement of municipal governance for better service delivery and transparency.
- 1.2. The project will cover all the Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) under KMA except Kolkata Municipal Corporation totaling 40 ULBs (list in Annex-1).
- 1.3. The Municipal Affairs Department (MAD) is the lead department for the project. Change Management Unit (CMU) has been created as an agency under MA Dept. to oversee the implementation of the project. Agencies like Kolkata Metropolitan Development Authority (KMDA), Directorate of Local Body (DLB), Municipal Engineering Directorate (MED), State Urban Development Agency (SUDA), Institute of Local Government and Urban Studies (ILGUS), West Bengal Valuation Board (WBVB) have been identified as support agencies facilitating ULBs in proper discharge of their functions. They have been allocated their responsibilities and one representative from each support agency have been nominated by the respective head of the office to act as member of CMU.

2. Objectives

2.1. GoWB is keen to introduce municipal eGovernance in the 40 ULBs under the project to promote finance, administrative efficiency, municipal services, decentralisation, information sharing and transparency.

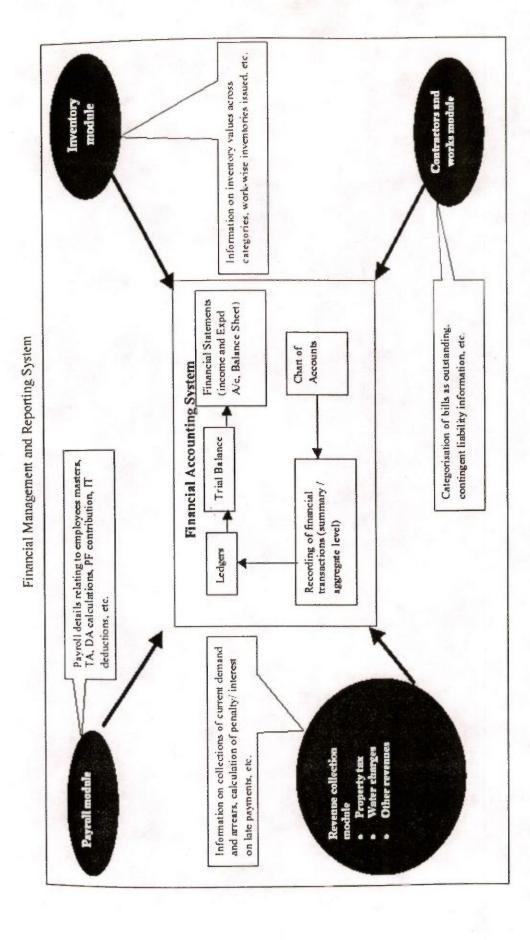

Sir.

At the outset I thank your ULB for your cooperation in smooth fund flow of KUSP in the first year. However, during our fund flow management, some difficulties have been experienced both at your end and our end. To ensure uniformity in fund management and for better management of KUSP funds, I would like to apprise you once again the procedures regarding release of KUSP fund and

accounting thereof as follows:

Accounting Support Agency appointed by CMU will visit your ULB within the first week of each calendar month for verification of the following reports and accounting records so far as they relate to the immediately preceding calendar month: Subsidiary Cash Book for KUSP, Bank Reconciliation Statement (BRS) relating to KUSP bank account, Statement of Expenditure (SOE), Utilisation Certificate (UC), and Accounting Reports in prescribed proforma already circulated to you. After verification of the same, one copy each, duly signed by you and also by the official under whose supervision such reports are being prepared, of SOE, UC, BRS, Abstract of ULB Cash Book and Summary of Accounts for CMU in prescribed proforma is to be handed over to the Accounting Support Agency who will also sign these documents as verified and found correct and will submit their observations on such documents to the CMU. No UC should be sent directly to CMU. It may be noted that M/s Abhyuday & Associates working as Accounting Support Agency during the last financial year has been appointed as the same for the current financial year also.

In preparation of the above reports and in recording the KUSP transactions in the ULB books of account, assistance from the Accounts & Finance Coordinator may be obtained. The Accounts & Finance Coordinator and the Finance Officer/concerned official looking after the finance & accounts should keep in close touch with the Financial Adviser, CMU, and Accounts Officer, CMU, in this regard. A software programme for the KUSP accounts will be installed by the Accounting Support Agency shortly. The Accounts & Finance Coordinator and the Finance Officer/concerned official looking after the finance & accounts are requested to get the necessary data entry thereto each month. Both soft copy and hard copy (duly signed)

are to be handed over to the Accounting Support Agency.

Authority for incurring expenditure under each component of the KUSP, (e.g., Slum 3. level Infrastructure Fund, Incentive fund, Capacity Building, Support to Health



Services, etc.), and wherever necessary allotment for a particular component (e.g., SLIF, IF, Purchase of Computers, Contingent expenditure, Furniture & contingencies under the Capacity Building component, etc.), are being sent to the respective ULBs from time to time. All the expenditure in connection with the KUSP project is to be incurred strictly in adherence to these guidelines/authorities issued by CMU from time to time, and also within the allotment wherever applicable. Only that expenditure which has been duly authorized by the CMU will be allowed. Expenditure which does not conform to the guidelines/authorities issued by the CMU is to be borne by the ULB itself.

No expenditure for KUSP should be made either from CMU fund or from ULB fund without proper authorization from CMU.

Requisition of fund may be placed to CMU directly if KUSP fund at the hand of the 5. respective ULB comes down within 20% (subject to maximum of Rs.2,00,000/-) of the last installment of fund placed by the CMU. On receipt of such requisitions stating the fact that KUSP fund has come down within 20% of the last installment, advances will be released in installments, each installment being of Rs.10,00,000/-. However, if a particular ULB incurs KUSP programme related expenditure out of the Municipal General Fund (for lack of KUSP fund in hand) within the guidelines/authorities issued by the CMU, concerned ULB may claim forthwith reimbursement of the same.

On the basis of requisition, fund will be placed at the disposal of a particular ULB. 6. Such fund should be treated as advance. Out of such fund (i.e., advance) any expenditure within the guidelines/authorities, and within the allotment wherever applicable, issued by the CMU on any of the components may be incurred. On receipt of UC and SOE through the Accounting Support Agency, the actual expenditure will

be adjusted against such advances.

It is advisable that all the amounts deducted from the salary bills/party bills (e.g., 7. P.F., P. Tax, I. Tax, Security Deposit, S. Tax, etc.) are to be taken out from the KUSP fund to the General Fund of the ULB. Such funds should not admix with the

KUSP fund at your hand.

Responsibilities of M/s Abhyuday & Associates appointed as Accounting Support Agency to CMU include all the tasks assigned to them in the last financial year. They should be extended all sorts of cooperation. It may be assured from your end that all records, papers and documents are ready on the appointed day (fixed up over phone) they visit you in the first week of each calendar month. If no report is provided to them, KUSP transaction for that month in your ULB will be taken as NIL and provision of further fund under the KUSP fund may be disrupted.

Administration Report of CMU

Change Management Unit (CMU) was created as an agency by Municipal Affairs Department (M.A.Dept.) with Secretary, M.A.Dept. as the Chairman. The agency was registered on 25.08.2003 with the following main objects..

- a. to identify and cause the municipal corporation, municipalities and notified area authorities (hereinafter referred to as 'local bodies') and such authorities and agencies as may be directed by the Government of West Bengal (Hereinafter referred to as "State Government") to identify the weaker sections of the community consisting of households in the municipal urban areas lying below the poverty line as defined by the State Government from time to time (hereinafter referred to as "urban poor"), and to ascertain their socio-economic conditions with the objective of initiating and pursuing with appropriate actions for generating income and employment opportunities for them;
- b. to promote, and to help and assist the local bodies to implement such programmes as would reach out the urban poor with urban basic services like civic infrastructure, literacy, primary health care, mother and child care, shelter upgradation and so on;
- c. to implement and cause to be implemented anti-poverty programmes in such a manner as to offer special incentives to the Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe communities and women to encourage them to participate and benefit from the programme;
- d. to arrange and cause to be arranged capacity building of the local bodies, different state Govt. Bodies, authorities and agencies;
- e. to promote and cause to be created in the areas within the local bodies infrastructural facilities such as water supply, roads, drainage, sanitation, solid waste management, sewerage, street light, etc;
- f. to promote and cause to be prepared Draft Development Plan (DDP) and Annual Development Plan (ADP) for the Urban Local Bodies.
- g. To promote Municipal reforms.
- h. to undertake such responsibilities related to urban development as may be assigned by the State Government from time to time;

- to draw up plans and programmes and implement them through local bodies or otherwise, coordinate activities of various relevant agencies and authorities, and perform such task as may be considered necessary for attaining the objectives in conformity with the policy and directives of the State Government;
- j. to provide management training inputs for all categories of urban development functionaries, disseminate knowledge and ideas through seminars, workshops, conferences and publications;
- k. to review the progress of execution of these activities, evaluate their impact on the urban poor and other groups of urban populace.

The M.A.Dept. entrusted CMU with the responsibility of managing and monitoring the programme of Kolkata Urban Services for the Poor (KUSP), funded by Department For International Development (DFID), Govt. of UK. The programme started from April, 2004 and will continue for 8 years.

Synopsis of KUSP

KUSP is a programme aiming at a sustainable improvement of quality of life for urban poor. To sustain an overall development the programme supports improved municipal services, economic development for the poor and a sustainable preventive health care system owned by a duly capacitated ULB. Along with improvement of civic infrastructures like water supply, sanitation and drainage in the municipal area, the programme acts as a vehicle for municipal reforms improving revenue, accounts, technical and administrative efficiency of the Urban Local Bodies (ULBs). The important tools proposed are Resource Mobilization, improved urban governance, inclusive planning and Capacity Building of ULBs along with the Govt. and semi-Govt. agencies responsible for facilitating ULB functions. Citizen's (specially the vulnerable groups) participation in planning, implementation and post work management of the assets is a priority. To develop a coordinated action plan through out the state the programme envisages preparation of an urban strategy for West Bengal. Howrah gets special attention in the programme and provision has been made to prepare a Rejuvenation and Development Plan for the city. The project will cost Rs.739.83 crore out of which Rs.626.21 crore will come as financial aid, Rs.25.20 crore from Govt. of West Bengal and Rs.88.62 crore through technical co-operation which will be managed directly by DFID. Out of the financial aid 71.75%, 5% and 4.4% will be for infrastructure development, economic development and health support respectively. The rest goes for Capacity Building (11.20%) planning (3.04%), monitoring and management (4.6%).

While the total project period is 8 years there will be a funding review at the end of 3 years when the project performance will be evaluated by an external agency against indicators to be developed by CMU and agreed between GoWB and DFID. The preparation of good quality DDPs for at least 12 municipalities will be a key indicator. If the outcome of the evaluation is not satisfactory, funding for all items will cease, except for slum level infrastructure for continuation of which ULBs will have to demonstrate, through an external evaluation, that they meet a minimum standard relating to the management of slum infrastructure.

Planning, capacity building and reforms will be the major components of the 1st three years of the project when only 14.7% of infrastructure fund will be available as against 97% of planning and 40.8% of capacity building. The major fund flow for infrastructure works and economic development will be coming from year 4 after the planning is completed and documented through DDP.

Developing a robust process for the preparation of DDPs that reflects a consensus of all stakeholders and the preparation of DDPs themselves lies at the heart of this project. The West Bengal Municipal Act 1993 requires ULBs to prepare "Draft Development Plans" addressing the entire range of municipal functions. KUSP envisages the DDP as a comprehensive business plan of the ULBs that set out a broad vision and strategy while also providing the framework for allocating project funds and government support. DDPs will address: economic development, health, education, land-use planning and control, infrastructure development, ULB revenue and expenditure, operation and maintenance of services, organisation development and management issues. The DDP will provide a mechanism for bringing about convergence of different state and GoI programmes. The process can potentially be used as an instrument to incrementally make ULBs self-reliant and redefine ULB-State Govt. relationship.

The main focus for the first three years will be on systemic changes in ULBs and support organisations consisting of

- i. Organisational Development
- ii. Introduction of Self assessed unit area based property tax, GIS & MIS and accrual based double entry accounting system
- iii. Enhancement of revenue and audit of expenditure.
- iv. Augmentation of technical resource.

- v. Bottom up planning, implementation and post work management involving community based organisations like ward committee.
- vi. Preparation of Draft Development Plan (DDP) for five (5) years and Annual Development Plan (ADP)
- vii. Remodeling of Working relation of Support agencies like MED, DLB, SUDA, ILGUS and WBVB among themselves and optimizing their help process to ULBs.
- viii. Fund allotment to ULBs through competitive process.
- ix. Slum level infrastructure works to be planned, implemented and managed (post work) by slum level organisations.
- x. DFID to review the procurement procedures for contractors, suppliers and service providers.
- xi. Strong quality check of works, accounts & procurement procedure through third party quality support agency and external audit.

M.A.Dept. is the lead department for the project. Change Management Unit (CMU) has been created as an agency under MA Dept. to oversee the implementation of the project. MA Deptt. sanctioned posts to strengthen CMU with expertise in different professions like Municipal Finance, Urban Planning, Urban Poverty, Economic Development, Health, Engineering, Information Technology etc. Most of the posts have been manned. Each ULB has formed a Project Implementation Team who are in close contact with CMU. Agencies like Kolkata Metropolitan Development Authority (KMDA), Directorate of Local Body (DLB), Municipal Engineering Directorate (MED), State Urban Development Agency (SUDA), Institute of Local Government and Urban Studies (ILGUS), West Bengal Valuation Board (WBVB) have been identified as support agencies facilitating ULBs in proper discharge of their functions. They have been allocated their responsibilities and one representative from each support agency have been nominated by the respective head of the office to act as member of CMU. A sub-committee under KMPC has specially been created for guiding and monitoring the project. DFID from technical co-operation fund has appointed an interim support consultancy to assists CMU for initial period till CMU is not strengthened with induction of different expertise.

Procurement

It has been mentioned in the project memorandum that DFID will review the procurement rules of State Govt. and the same need be followed for all procurements under KUSP. The manual is under preparation by DFID through a consultant. Pending final review and preparation of the manual CMU has developed interim rules for procurement of equipments, materials and works mostly on the basis of the present municipal accounts rules with minor modifications as suggested by DFID and agreed by procurement committee appointed by Municipal Affairs Department for procurements under KUSP. For procurement of services a manual has been prepared by CMU on the basis of KEIP rules approved by DFID. The manual has been duly approved by the procurement committee and agreed by DFID. These interim rules & manual prepared by CMU will be effective for one year. The accounting procedure and fund flow system has been drawn up by CMU and agreed by Municipal Affairs Department. The same is being followed till the final procurement manual is ready.

Capacity Building

Capacity Building both at ULB level and support organisation level was the key focus during year one of the programme. This was designed professionally and action plans were drawn for

- a. Internal organisation development
- b. Professional support to ULBs with introduction of technical people
- c. Building of database
- d. Skill development through training
- e. Introduction of modern equipments like computers and other equipments

Each ULB has drawn an organisation development plan to develop a more efficient and transparent system both on short term, medium term and long term basis. CMU has proposed one professional OD personnel for 4-5 municipalities to carry forward the action plans. To improve Administration in-service Executive Officers and Finance Officers are being introduced in each ULB in addition to one Engineer and one Accounts professional. To help ULBs in preparation of good quality Draft Development Plans and Annual Development Plans the process of procurement of one Urban Planner for each ULB has already started. Development of a database was one of the major focus in capacity building and actions for preparation of digitized Base Map and GIS for

all the ULBs under KUSP has been initiated in the first year and is expected to be completed within year two and three. A training advisory committee has been setup to assess training needs and to determine implementation process. The target groups are elected representatives, technical, non-technical and grass root level functionaries. ILGUS has been chosen as the nodal agency to carry forward the training component with the help of different training institutes in Kolkata. In view of the decision that slum level works under KUSP programme will be implemented through community contracting, training of CDS members along with RCVs is one of the priorities. ILGUS through a mobile team of experienced engineers arranged to train the CDS of all ULBs during this year. The training contained rudimentary municipal engineering, accounts, tender formalities etc. required to take up works on community contract basis. It was felt that such training is to be repeated with further inputs at least twice for each ULB next year.

One of the major reforms envisaged under the programme is introduction of Accrual Based Double Entry Accounting System in the ULBs. In year one itself considerable progress has been made in this regard. Guideline for preparation of opening balanced has been finalised and some of the ULBs have already prepared the opening balance sheet as on 01.04.2004. The manual on the accounting policies has also been finalised. The chart of accounts, forms & formats and manual on transaction entries are on the verge of completion. It is expected that by year 2005-2006 all ULBs will be able to introduce Double Entry System of Accounts.

The expenditure under Capacity Building for the year is Rs.25.60 lakhs against an allocated account of Rs.574.00 lakhs. The short fall is due to late start of the project.
