All the Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) provide outreach services through fortnightly home visit by 1538 no. of Honorary Health Worker (HHW) engaged from community. One HHW covers 1,000 to 1,500 BPL population.

- Treatment of minor ailments at door-step of the beneficiaries.
- Awareness on women and child Health, gender equality, age at marriage / pregnancy, public Health, National Health Programme etc.
- Distribution of condoms, oral contraceptive pills, IFA, ORS etc.
- Early registration of pregnancies, pregnancy care, clean and safe delivery, nutritional care during pregnancy, identification of danger signs during pregnancy.
- Counselling regarding breast-feeding, weaning and immunizations.

Second Tier:

All the ULBs provide clinic services from 328 nos. of Urban Sub-Centre each covering 10,000 population. Each Sub-Centre is manned by First Tier Supervisor (FTS) daily and part-time Medical Officer on clinic days i.e. ANC / PNC Clinic, Immunisation Clinic, Growth Monitoring Clinic, General Treatment clinic, Awareness Programme on gender equality, age at married pregnancy, contraceptive adoption etc. The Sub-Centres are functioning from the rented accommodation.

Third Tier:

Referral services either in the Municipal owned Health facilities or in the Government run nearby hospital.

Procurement

The manual for procurement is under preparation by DFID through a consultant. Pending final review and preparation of the manual, interim rules have been drafted for procurement of equipments, materials and works mostly on the basis of the present municipal accounts rules with minor modifications as suggested by DFID and agreed by procurement committee appointed by department for procurements under KUSP. For procurement of services a manual has been prepared on the basis of KEIP rules approved by DFID. The manual has been duly approved by the procurement committee and agreed by DFID. These interim rules & manual prepared will be effective for one year. The accounting procedure and fund flow system has been drawn up by CMU with approval of the department. The same is being followed till the final procurement manual is ready.

5.11.2 Programmes taken up with the Italian Assistance

A Project amounting to Rs. 125 crores for Water Supply and Solid Waste Management in 14 municipal towns of the State, namely Purulia, Jhalda, Bankura, Sonamukhi, Bishnupur, Jhargram, Jalpaiguri, Alipurduar, Mal, Cooch-Behar, Dinhata, Mathabhanga, Mekliganj and Haldibari with Italian Assistance has been launched by the Hon'ble Chief Minister, West Bengal in presence of Italian Minister on 18th January 2005. The Italian assistance for this scheme is Rs.100 crores which will be received as a soft loan with a very low rate of interest with 24 years of moratorium and a repayment period of 15 years. State Government will have to contribute Rs. 25 Crores. For this, some provisions have already been made in the Budget estimate. The project will be implemented by a project monitoring cell with assistance of MED. The time span for execution of the project is 36 months and has been designed to take care of the demand of the concerned ULBs as in the year 2011.

Out of 126 ULBs, 63 ULBs are already covered under Community Based Primary Health Care Programme. Health programmes which have been implemented for urban poor in 63 ULBs are:

- » CUDP III
- » CSIP
- » IPP-VIII

- » RCH Sub-Project, Asansol
- » European Commission
- » HHW Scheme

The objectives of the programmes are:

- » to reduce maternal & child morbidity and mortality
- » to promote family welfare amongst the target population
- » to ensure Primary Health Care Services at the doorstep of the target population

- » Treatment of Minor Ailments
- » Linkage for implementation of National Health Programmes

IPP-VIII Extension Project

World Bank assisted IPP-VIII (Extension) Project for 10 ULBs outside Kolkata Metropolitan Area has been completed in June, 2002. In similar fashion as IPP-VIII, this project has been continuing with State assistance. Upto February, 2005, fund to the tune of Rs.3.39 crore has been released by the State Government. Achievements under this project are presented in Table No. 29.

RCH Project

RCH Project taken up to improve the basic health condition within Asansol Municipal Corporation external funding came to an end on 31st March, 2004. The project is similar to that of IPP-VIII and IPP-VIII (Extn.) and the facilities created are being continued with support from the State Government. Achievements under this project are shown in Table No. 30.

Honorary Health Workers' Scheme

DFID funded Honorary Health Workers' Scheme has been launched in 11 Non-KMA municipalities from 1.2.2004 for 1 year with a budget of Rs.5.90 crore. The project period has been extended upto 30.6.2005. Primary Health Care Services for 2.58 lacs BPL population are taken care of by the grass-root level health functionaries i.e. community based Honorary Health Workers (260 nos.), First Tier Supervisor (55 nos.) and Part Time Medical Officer through 260 Blocks, 55 Sub-Health Posts and 11 Health Posts. There will be no new construction under the project.

Constitution of Municipal Level Health & Family Welfare Committee, formation of Municipal Management Cell and detailment of Project Director i.e. ADM/SDO have been completed in all the ULBs. Job orientation training for Honorary Health Workers have been completed in 10 ULBs, the remaining one will be completed by March, 2005. For referral care service linkage with Government facilities have been established.

Immunisation clinics, Antenatal / Postnatal care clinic and health check up by Medical Officers have already been started.

Each of the ULBs has opened separate Bank Account for the scheme, jointly operated by Project Director and the Chairperson of the Urban Local Bodies. An expenditure for Rs.87 lacs has been incurred.

5.11.4 Kolkata Environment Improvement Project (KEIP)

For the purpose of improvement of drainage system and underground sewerage system for the added areas of Kolkata Municipal Corporation and for the purpose of Slum development within Kolkata Municipal Corporation area, a project namely, Kolkata Environment Improvement Project had been taken up from April, 2002 with the assistance from the Asian Development Bank and Department For International Development (DFID). Out of the total project cost of Rs.1711 crores, the ADB loan will amount to Rs.1012 crore, the DFID assistance will be to the tune of Rs.193 crore and the contribution of the State Government and KMC will be Rs.2.51 crore and Rs.254 crore respectively. Under this project, improvement of canals for about 53 kilometres of length and improvement of sewerage and drainage system of a vast area and the work of slum development will be taken up. The DFID assistance will be spent for capacity building and for modernisation of various departments of Kolkata Municipal Corporation. The work for Drainage and Sewerage Improvement amounting to nearly Rs.150 crores around Behala area is about to be taken up. The work of improvement of canals has been started. The development work has also been started in slum areas. On this account an amount of Rs.11.44 crore has also been sanctioned as share of the State Government. The project will continue till 2007. For proper implementation and monitoring of the project, a High Power Steering Committee consisting of representatives of both the State Government and Kolkata Municipal Corporation has been constituted. Both the State Government and Kolkata Municipal Corporation are paying special attention for proper implementation and timely completion of the project. So far, an amount of Rs.46.80 crore has been spent in this project including ADB grant.

5.12 Programmes of other Departments

5.12.1 Fruit and vegetable market

This scheme of Horticulture and Food Processing Department of the State Government is being implemented in 14 towns in the First Phase with the objectives :

- » to store and preserve fruits, vegetables and flowers produced and fish available in surplus in the selected towns
- » to ensure that the farmers / fishermen should get the right price of their products and labour
- » to develop high quality Horticulture Farms in identified areas
- » to develop post-harvesting management infrastructure
- » to promote consumption of fruits and vegetables in fresh and processed form.

Horticulture includes fruits, vegetables, root and tuber crops, stem, mushroom, honey, floriculture, medicinal and aromatic plants and nuts etc. Emphasis has been given in improving land use, promoting crop diversification generating employment and providing nutritional security.

The markets will improve linkage between horticulture producers and consumers to create integrated network for marketing of horticultural produce to increase producers share in consumer price.

The markets will have a mini cold storage unit comprising Pre-cooling units, cold rooms, Ante rooms, Packing & Grading areas with provisions of loading and unloading arrangements and space for Auction. Thus a complete storage and marketing centers are provided. In fact this type of regulated market will provide means for the direct producers to get the justified price for their products as well as prevention of wastage. Funding pattern for the project is as under.

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5.13.3 Community Based Primary Health Care Services in 63 Non-KMA ULBs

Plan is being finalised to bring 63 ULBs which were not covered by any of the projects earlier, having an estimated urban population of 11.23 lakhs under Primary Health Care system. The objective is to bring about an overall improvement in urban health scenario with reference to reduction in CBR, CDR, MMR, IMR & enhancement of CPR by providing primary health care services to the urban population with focus on reproductive & Child Health of BPL population, implementation of National Health Programmes. Package of primary health care services include ante natal / post natal, promotion of institutional delivery, immunisation, promotion of breast feeding and proper winning, growth monitoring of under-5 children, family welfare programmes, RTIs, adolescent health cares, treatment of minor ailments, surveillance of community diseases and conduction of various awareness programmes.

One Honorary Healthy Worker (HHW) is proposed to be allotted for a population not exceeding 1000 BPL contained in a single ward. There will be a minimum of 1 HHW per ward regardless of whether that ward has BPL population or not. Estimated no. of HHWs is 1266. A Sub-Centre, the nerve centre for delivery of primary health care services is proposed to be established for each 5000 BPL population. Estimated no. of Sub-Centre is 283.

One Out Patient Department will be established for every 40,000 BPL population of the ULB. Referral services will be availed from the nearest Govt. hospital like District, Sub-Division, State General hospital, BPHC, rural hospital as will be applicable.

Community participation is enforced at all levels for maximum utilisation of health facilities.

The estimated budget for 63 ULBs for 3 years is Rs.5829.68 lakhs.

5.13.4 Jawaharlal Nehru National Urban Renewal Mission

The Government of India has launched a Jawaharlal Nehru National Urban Renewal Mission (JNNURM) in the current fiscal year to encourage cities to initiate steps to bring about improvement in the existing service levels in a financially sustainable manner. The JNNURM consists of two sub-missions: the Urban Infrastructure and Governance and the Basic Services to the Urban Poor. It believes that in order to make cities work efficiently and equitably, it is essential to create incentives and support urban reforms at state and city levels; develop appropriate enabling and regulatory frameworks; enhance the creditworthiness of municipalities; and integrate the poor with the service delivery system.

Objectives

The primary objective of the JNNURM is to create economically productive, efficient, equitable and responsive cities. In line with this objective, the Mission focuses on:

- » Integrated development of infrastructure services;
- » Securing linkages between asset creation and maintenance for long-run project sustainability;
- » Accelerating the flow of investment into urban infrastructure services;
- » Planned development of cities including the peri-urban areas, outgrowths, and urban corridors;
- » Renewal and re-development of inner city areas; and
- » Universalisation of urban services so as to ensure their availability to the urban poor.

Institutional Framework

The JNNURM will function under the overall guidance and supervision of a National Steering Group (NSG) to be chaired by the Minister of Urban Development and co-chaired by the Minister of State for Urban Employment and Poverty Alleviation respectively.

At the state level, the JNNURM will be co-ordinated by the State Level Steering Committees to be headed by the Chief Ministers. The State Level Steering Committees will review and prioritise proposals for inclusion in the JNNURM. The State Level Committees will be supported by nodal agencies who will invite project proposals, appraise them, and manage and monitor the JNNURM.

Thrust Areas

The JNNURM is designed to support:

- » Water supply including setting up of desalination plants :
- » Sewerage and sanitation
- » Solid waste management including hospital waste management











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- Construction and improvement of drains and storm-water drainage system
- Road network
- Urban transport
- Construction and development of bus and truck terminals
- Renewal and re-development of inner city areas
- Development of heritage areas
- Preservation of water bodies
- Integrated development of slums, i.e. housing and development of infrastructure in slum settlements
- Provision of basic services too the urban poor; and
- Street lighting

JNNURM Reform Agenda

The Mission requires the state governments and cities seeking assistance to undertake reforms in order to achieve its objectives. The reforms are in two parts : (i) mandatory and (ii) optional

Mandatory Reforms : State-level

To be undertaken at the state level, the manadatory reforms are :

- Effective implementation of decentralisation initiatives as envisaged in the Constitution (seventy-fourth) Amendment Act, 1992
- Repeal of Urban Land (Ceiling and Regulation) Act, 1976 *
- Reform of Rent Control laws, by balancing the interests of landlords and tenants *
- Rationalisation of stamp duty to bring it down to no more than 5 per cent within seven years
- Enactment of a public disclosure law
- Enactment of a community participation law, so as to institutionalise citizens' participation in local decision making; and
- Association of elected municipalities with the city planning function.

Mandatory Reforms : Municipal-level

To be undertaken at the level of municipalities, the reforms comprise:

- Adoption of a modern, accrual-based, double entry system of accounting
- Introduction of a system of e-governance using IT applications, GIS and MIS for various urban services
- Reform of property tax with GIS, and arrangements for its effective implementation so as to raise collection efficiency to 85 per cent
- Levy of reasonable user charges, with the objective that full cost of operation and maintenance is collected within seven years
- Internal earmarking of budgets for basic services to the urban poor; and
- Provision of basic services to the urban poor, including security of tenure at affordable prices.

Optional Reforms

- Revision of bye-laws to streamline the approval process for construction of buildings, development of sites etc.
- Simplification of legal and procedural frameworks for conversion of agricultural land for non-agricultural purposes
- Introduction of property title certification
- Earmarking of at least 20-25 per cent developed land in housing projects for economically weaker sections and low income groups with a system of crosssubsidisation
- Introduction of computerised registration of land and property
- Revision of bye-laws to make rainwater harvesting manadatory in all buildings, and adoption of water conservation measures
- Bye-laws for reuse of recycled water
- Administrative reforms including reduction in establishment cost by introducing voluntary retirement schemes and surrender of posts falling vacant due to retirement
- Structural reforms; and
- Encouraging public private-partnership.

(iv) National Urban Health Mission (NUHM)

To strengthen existing Urban Health services, NUHM will be implemented in 92 ULBs (each ULB having population 50,000 & above) covering approx two Crore population. The service provision will include OPD, basic Lab. Diagnosis, Drug / contraceptive dispensing, delivery of Reproductive & Child Health services as well as preventive & promotive aspects of all communicable and non-communicable diseases. For the purpose, Project Implementation Plan (PIP) has been prepared in 1st phase by DHFW in consultation with the concerned 26 Municipalities (District towns) and 06 Municipal Corporations & SUDA. The PIP for 32 Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) has been approved by Govt. of India for FY 2013-14 for which a dissemination meeting was held on 24.03.2014 wherein Department of Health & Family Welfare, Department of Municipal Affairs, CMOH of all the Health Districts and the representative of 32 ULBs participated. Furthermore, data / documents for preparation of PIP for 35 ULBs out of rest 60 ULBs for FY 2014-15 has already been submitted to Dept. of Health & Family Welfare.

MD, NHM in her letter dt. 28.03.2014 has requested Principal Secretary, Dept. of Municipal Affairs to take necessary action regarding formation of City NUHM Society and registering under Society Registration Act. and opening of Bank A/C by each of the 5 Municipal Corporations which was placed to the Department for according approval.

Following to that a few queries had been raised by the Jt. Secretary vide his memo no. 319-MA/C-10/3S-17/2014 dt. 17.04.2014. A reply had already been sent by SUDA vide reference no. SUDA-Health/411/13/03 dt. 30.04.2014.

A meeting was held between the Principal Secretary, Department of Health & Family Welfare and the Principal Secretary, Department of Municipal Affairs and Director, SUDA along with concerned officials of both the Departments and SUDA on 26.05.2014 at Swasthya Bhawan. A note has been placed by the Health Department to the Hon'ble Chief Minister for grant and approval regarding implementation of NUHM in 32 ULBs and allocation of responsibility amongst the Departments.

(v) Janani Suraksha Yojana (JSY)

Janani Suraksha Yojana has been introduced by the Govt. of India, aiming at reducing overall Maternal Mortality Rate & Infant Mortality Rate by providing Antenatal care, identifying pregnancy related complications and increasing Institutional Deliveries.

Pregnant women of BPL, SC & ST category after completion of 3rd Antenatal Checkup will receive incentive of Rs. 900/- only in case of Institutional Delivery and Rs. 500/- in case of home delivery through A/C Payee Cheque.

Health & Family Welfare Dept. is the Nodal Department of the State. Since Financial Year 2006-07, State Urban Development Agency has been functioning as the Nodal Agency for Urban JSY of the State. So far total amount of JSY Fund of Rs. 20.75 Crore has been received from Health & Family Welfare Dept. An amount of Rs. 16.89 Crore have been utilized for the purpose. Total no. of JSY beneficiaries stands at 3.06 lakh.

(vi) Prevention & Control of Vector Borne Diseases

- Out of total sanctioned amount of Rs. 449.46 lakh, Rs. 224.74 lakh has been released to 126 ULBs in FY 2013-14 for purchase of Larvicidal Oil, IEC, printing of leaflet & Training.
- House to house visit for surveillance of fever cases due to Dengue / Malaria will be held / already held in 41 ULBs as identified by DHFW w.e.f. June, 2014. For the purpose, a trainers training has already been held at SUDA on 22.05.2014 and Micro-plan for conduct of house to house visit have already been received from the 41 ULBs.
- House to house visit have been completed by 34 ULBs.

- Report of the Committee constituted vide Notification of Department of MA bearing no. 821/MA/C-10/3S-37/2009 dt. 13.12.2011 relating to required policy decision was sent on 05.06.2012 to MA Dept.
